Annual Meeting

The Annual Meeting was held Monday, September 27 in the Pioneer Gallery at the Museum. Andrea Schiffelbein was presented a Certificate of Appreciation for her many years of dedication to the Board of Directors. It was Andrea's last night on the board. It was announced that Sheri Volland, Burlington, was elected as the new board member and would be joining the Board of Directors at the next regular meeting. Those who attended enjoyed a wonderful presentation from our curator, Shirley Logan. She explained the process of accessioning, what happens to a donated item when it is presented to the museum. First, a form is filled out saying the owner is giving the item unconditionally to the museum. Next, it is properly cleaned, marked, researched, and put it to the computer system. After all is said and done, the artifact finds a home in a display or storage. In Shirley's presentation, she explained how she

accessioned a child's wagon and how it took her 32 hours and 30 minutes to clean and accession it. She also showed the crowd the number of stamps the museum has acquired from the Duane Fitch Estate. She explained how it took her four hours and thirty minutes to clean and

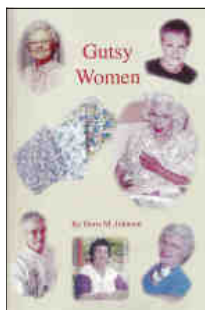
accession one stamp. The museum has 11,823 stamps (we are still finding more stamps) and it will take more than 17 years before they are all cleaned and accessioned! We strongly encourage everyone to attend next year's meeting on Monday, September 26, 2011.

7 - Pound Christmas Fudge

1 C. chopped nuts

2 pkgs. (11.5-oz. each) milk chocolate bits

1 lg. jar (13-oz.) marshmallow cream

4 C. sugar

1 tall can (13-oz.) evaporated milk

1 lb. butter

2 tsp. vanilla

**3 lg. (8-oz. each) milk chocolate bars,
broken in sm. pieces**

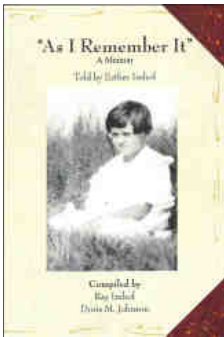
In a large mixing bowl, combine chocolate bars, chocolate bits, and marshmallow cream; set aside. In large heavy saucepan combine sugar, evaporated milk and butter. Cook and stir over medium heat until mixture boils; boil 5 minutes. Pour hot mixture over chocolate mixture. Beat until ingredients are thoroughly blended; beat in vanilla and nuts. Quickly pour mixture into a buttered 9x13-inch pan. Cool cover lightly and refrigerate until firm enough to cut into small pieces (flavor will be best after a week or two of storage.) This recipe makes 7 pounds of fudge.

Every Christmas Gary and I make this fudge. We have been doing this for the last 35 years. Gary really makes it; I just open the bags and jars and grease the pans!

Genealogy Library

We are very proud of our Genealogy Library. There is a large collection of microfilm that includes town newspapers throughout the county and census records. The earliest paper on microfilm is the Neosho Valley Register from 1859. Thanks to our wonderful volunteers, we have obituaries, birth announcements, anniversaries, and wedding announcements indexed and in binders. We also have birth and marriage records that are also indexed. There are also binders that include information on different families and topics such as John Redmond (both the man and the dam), One Room Schoolhouses, Orphan Trains, and Churches.

We are also proud to have a collection of yearbooks in the Genealogy Library available for researchers. Our collection includes Strawn, Gridley, LeRoy, Burlington, Lebo, Waverly, and Southern Coffey County. The museum relies on the donation of the older yearbooks to put in our collection. We are asking the public for their help to donate the missing

yearbooks in our collection.

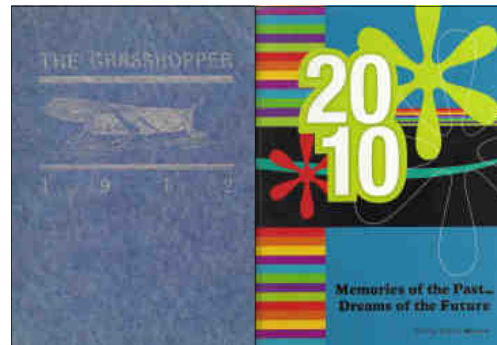

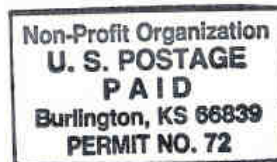
